Helping Indigenous Communities in Saskatchewan Navigate the Law

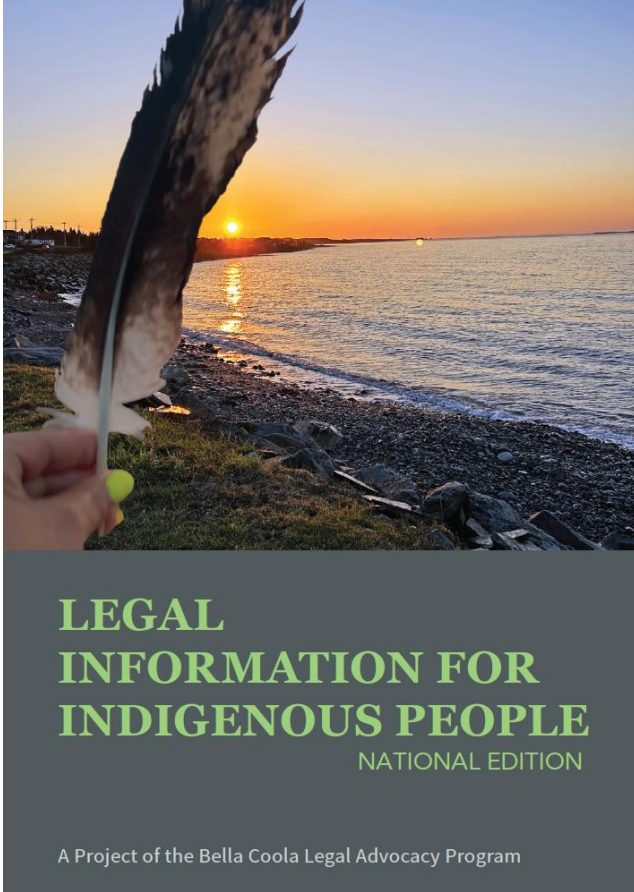
Access to legal information is helpful for everyone, building awareness of legal rights, responsibilities, and options for resolving legal problems. Indigenous people, however, are overrepresented in the criminal justice and child welfare systems and have specific legal information needs. With support from the Department of Justice Canada, the project began in 2022 with a legal information needs assessment, conducted in collaboration with Indigenous communities.

In addition to the site's content, the project also created several print booklets and pamphlets, as well as resources for teachers to use in educational settings. Several videos, translated into Cree, are also incorporated into the website.

Information providers in Saskatchewan are encouraged to direct Indigenous and all members of the public to [Legal Information for Indigenous Communities](#) to learn more about the law.
